Course Info:

AP Music Theory (Period 3 – Yearlong Course, UC A-G Approved)

Course Description and Performance Standards:

Students in the *AP Music Theory* course will cover a comprehensive and pedagogical study of music. This course, which is college curriculum based, is designed for the music academic student who can already read music at a minimum intermediate level. Students will learn harmonic procedures for vocal and instrumental textures, techniques of voice leading, harmonic structure, form and analysis, aural listening and reading skills, dictation, and music vocabulary all in preparation to take the culminating National A.P. Music Theory exam in May of 2019.

Prerequisites:

Enrollment in course, ability to read in at least one clef, and/or by the recommendation of the instructor.
